		^UNLV	The University of Oregon softball team earned its third consecutive invite to the NCAA regional tournament, garnering a No. 2 seed at Regional No. 14, hosted by the Oklahoma Sooners. The Ducks' first round opponent is No. 3 seed Louisiana-Lafayette (50-8 overall), winners of the Sun Belt conference title. Oregon's appearance in the NCAA regional tournament is its third under head coach Kathy Arendsen and marks just the second time in school history that the Ducks have made it to the postseason (1998, 1999, 2000) in three straight seasons. Oregon will travel to Norman Tuesday and practice Wednesday and Thursday before its opening game vs. the Rajin' Cajuns Friday.

The regional winners will advance to super regional competition for a best-of-three series May 27-28 (Memorial Day Weekend) at eight campus sites. The remaining eight teams will advance to the WCWS, an eight-team, double-elimination tournament. The championship final will best-of-three-series for the first time this year. The WCWS will be conducted June 2-8 at the ASA Hall of Fame Stadium in Oklahoma City.

Washington scored at least one run in each of the first five innings and pitcher Ashley Boek had 12 strikeouts.

PERSPECTIVE

Prior to the arrival of Coach Arendsen in 2003, the Ducks made the NCAA regional tournament six times and had a total of just five players be named to the regional all-tournament team. Oregon is 9-4 in postseason play in the last two seasons and in its previous six appearances, the Ducks were a combined 9-11 and advanced to the regional championship game only one time (1989) — the year they made their lone WCWS appearance.

HEAD COACH KATHY ARENDSSEN (485-338 OVERALL, 27-35 PAC-10)

Third-year head coach Kathy Arendsen has returned the Duck softball program back to a competitor within the Pac-10 as well as on the national level. In Arendsen's first season, the Ducks finished T3rd in the Pac-10 with a 10-11 conference mark — their highest league finish since 1990. Last season, the Ducks won 10 conference games again and made their second straight trip to the NCAA Regional tournament. Oregon is once again returning to the postseason in 2005 as Arendsen guided the Ducks to seven conference wins this season. Included in those victories was a sweep over defending national champion UCLA, marking the first time in school history that Ducks have swept the Bruins in a season. And, for the second straight season, Oregon defeated Arizona at Howe Field, shutting out the Wildcats 3-0 on Apr. 29. Oregon freshman Lovena Chaput earned Pac-10 player of the week honors during the season and pitcher Amy Harris earned her second career Pac-10 pitcher of the week honor. Arendsen's first season was the memorable 2003 season, which ended with a 37-19 overall record as the Ducks won their most Pac-10 wins since 1998, back-to-back home wins over a conference opponent for the first time since 1998 and a sweep of Washington for the first time since 1993. There was more to come in 2004 as the team defeated every Pac-10 team for the first time since 1998. Oregon's 1-0 win over No. 1 Arizona marked the first time in school history that the Ducks defeated a top-ranked team and the squad won the series over Washington for the second straight year. It marked the first time in school history that Oregon won the series over the Huskies in back to back seasons. Following the 2004 season, several players were honored for their play. Pitcher Ani Nyhus earned first-team all-Pac-10 accolades while catcher Jenn Poore earned second-team all-conference honors. Beth Boskovich and Ashley Richards were honorable mention selections and the four were named to the NCAA regional all-tournament team while Poore also earned first-team Easton All-American honors. In November of 2004, Arendsen was the only American in the record class of 19 inductees to be elected into the International Softball Federation Hall of Fame. Arendsen is now a member of eight different Halls of Fame.

ASSISTANT COACHES, J. GAUDREAU AND AMY HAYES

Gaudreau is in her 12th season as head coach Kathy Arendsen's top assistant and her third season as Arendsen's assistant at the University of Oregon. Prior to her arrival at Oregon, Gaudreau spent six seasons as the top assistant at Mississippi State and her duties at Oregon have mirrored those as MSU. Gaudreau's focus with the Oregon program include hitting instruction, recruiting, individual defensive skill development, coordinating travel and academic support. The Ducks' offense continued to improve in 2004 as every returning starter improved in batting average, including Ashley Richards, who went from a .185 average to .315. And, after two seasons without a home run, Richards led the team with eight in 2004. As a team, Oregon improved in RBI (210) and hits (409) in Gaudreau's second season and all but one starter had at least one home run. In her first season with the Ducks, Oregon's improved offense was evident as the Ducks owned the top five spots in hits at the NCAA Regional, had the highest individual batting average, second-highest team hitting percentage, scored more runs than any other team and had the highest individual home run output at the tournament (4 by Andrea Vidlund). Amy Hayes has accumulated nine years of collegiate coaching experience in the Atlantic-10, America East and Missouri Valley Conferences prior to joining the Duck staff in the summer of 2004. Hayes serves as Oregon's primary pitching coach and also recruits, coordinates camps, oversees facilities, coordinates strength and conditioning workouts and oversees areas of travel. Before Oregon, Hayes served as the head coach at Boston University where she guided the program to back-to-back NCAA Regional appearances in 2002 and 2003. Under the direction of Hayes, the Terriers won back-to-back America East Tournament Championships and were regular season champions in 2001, 2002 and 2003. In 2002, Boston University players earned Player, Pitcher and Rookie of the Year awards, marking the first time in the history of the America East Conference that one team has won all three awards in a single season. In all, Hayes has coached four All-Region All-Americans, 10 All-America East Tournament players, 21 All-America East Conference players, two players of the year, two pitchers of the year and two rookies of the year.

VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT MIKE WHITE

With more than 25 years of national and international experience as a premier Fastpitch softball player, volunteer assistant Mike White is a perfect complement to the Oregon coaching staff. Prior to his role as a volunteer assistant with the Ducks in 2005, White spent two seasons as a full-time staff member with the team. White worked primarily with the pitchers and was key in Oregon's consecutive postseason runs. White will again work with the Duck pitching staff in his new role. In his first season with the Ducks, White helped guide a young pitching staff to great success as freshman Amy Harris finished the season with the single-season strikeout record (180) and junior AniAssa Meashintubby picked up her first two Pac-10 wins of her career in back-to-back games. In 2003, Oregon's team ERA improved from 3.01 in 2002 to 2.12 — its lowest team ERA since 1994 — in White's first season and the Ducks had 347 strikeouts compared to 223 in 2002. In 2004, Oregon's ERA dipped to 1.68 and the staff improved its strikeout total to 394. In 2004, Oregon pitchers continued to have success as junior transfer Ani Nyhus became the fifth pitcher in school history to record 20 or more wins, finishing the season 25-12 overall en route to earning first team all-pac-10 honors. Nyhus set the single season strikeout record (202), surpassing Harris' record from 2003, and pitched the program's 14th no-hitter vs. Utah State.

ARENSEN VS. THE UPCOMING OPPONENTS**Louisiana-Lafayette:** 1-4**Oklahoma:** 0-2**Wichita State:** 0-0**SCOUTING THE COMPETITION**

Louisiana-Lafayette: The Ragin' Cajuns are winners of the Sun Belt conference for the past five seasons and are led by All-American pitcher Brooke Mitchell. The team has made seven consecutive NCAA regional appearances and is in the midst of its 24th straight winning season. The Ragin' Cajuns (50-8), winners of 10 straight overall and 28 of their last 29 since March 29, were awarded the No. 3 seed and are looking to make their second WCWS appearance under head coach Stefni Lotief. Mitchell finished the season 27-7 overall with a 0.78 ERA and 338 strikeouts. Offensively, ULL is led by Jill Robertson's .384 average and Danyele Gomez' 19 home runs and 64 RBI. As a team, the Ragin' Cajuns have 76 home runs and 303 RBI on the season.

Oklahoma: The Sooners earned the No. 1 seed and are currently ranked No. 10 in the nation. Oklahoma wrapped up the season by going 2-2 at the Big 12 tournament, defeating Kansas and Texas A&M, but dropping games to Nebraska and Texas. Pitcher Kami Keiter was named to the all-tournament team, allowing just one earned run in 19.1 innings pitched. Senior Heather Scaglione was also named to the all-tournament team, boasting a .455 average.

MILESTONE

With a 3-1 victory over then-No. 3 UCLA on April 2nd, Oregon head coach Kathy Arendsen secured her 100th victory at Oregon and the Ducks are 113-63 in her tenure. Arendsen is 15 wins shy of 500 career victories.

MOVING UP THE CAREER LIST

Amy Harris: 6th all-time in games played (110); 7th all-time in wins (39); 7th all-time in complete games (31); 6th all-time in shutouts (10); 6th all-time in innings pitched (495.1); 2nd all-time in strikeouts (467)...Harris is seven strikeouts shy of the school record.

Beth Boskovich: T9th all-time with 18 home runs; 4th all-time in walks (81)...Boskovich has 87 career runs and is three shy of breaking into the top-10...Her 23 doubles is three shy of the top-10 list.

Breanne Sabol: 11th All-time with 26 career stolen bases

ALMOST THERE

Catcher Ashley Richards has 25 career doubles and needs just one more to break the top-10.

GAIL'S RETURN

Freshman infielder Joanna Gail, who went down with a dislocated elbow in the Ducks' second game of the season, made her return on April 20 vs. Portland State. Gail had two at bats as a pinch hitter in the game, going 0-1 and also being hit by a pitch. The Poway, Calif., native made her defensive return vs. Arizona State May 1st, coming in to play first base in relief of starter Kristi Leiter. Gail got her first start since the injury vs. UC Davis May 5 and had an RBI...the following day, Gail accounted for the Ducks' lone RBI vs. Stanford. Gail had her first Pac-10 start vs. California May 8.

RICHARDS' PAC-10 FAVORITE

Senior Ashley Richards has just two home runs in Pac-10 play during her four year career. Both homers have come against Arizona All-American Alicia Hollowell at Howe Field. In 2004 it was a walk off home run in the eighth and last week, Richards hit her second career home run off Hollowell to lead the Ducks to their second victory over the Wildcats in as many seasons.

Oregon has 67 stolen bases this season the most since the Ducks had 67 in 1999. The Ducks had 82 stolen bases in 1998.

SECURING THE SERIES

Under the guidance of Coach Arendsen, Oregon has now won the season series in at least one season from every Pac-10 school with the exception of California and Arizona. Oregon won the series vs. Oregon State, Washington and Stanford in back-to-back seasons (2003, 2004).

NOTES

*Oregon is third in the conference in doubles (66), triples (12) and stolen bases (67); freshman Lovena Chaput ranks fifth in the Pac-10 with 55 hits; Chaput's 10 doubles is seventh in the Pac-10; Amy Harris is fourth in the conference with a 1.16 ERA.

*With 65 stolen bases this season, Oregon has already surpassed its total (29) from all of 2004...First baseman Beth Boskovich has a career best nine stolen bases and has yet to be picked off...12 different players have at least one stolen base...Oregon stole 61 bases under Coach Arendsen in 2003, the most since 2000 (59)...With 19 stolen bases this year, Breanne Sabol has surpassed her total from the past two seasons combined (7).

*When leading after the fifth inning, Oregon is 24-1 overall; With a lead after six innings, the Ducks are a perfect 25-0.

*Oregon has been shutout just eight times this season and has won by shutout 19 times

*The Ducks are 27-3 when they outhit their opponent and 2-18 when an opponent has more hits...Oregon is 28-9 when not giving up a home run...When the Ducks don't commit an error, they are 18-3.

*Oregon is down 10 games this season; Every preseason tournament except one was cut short or cancelled due to rain...The Ducks added a doubleheader with Santa Clara on Apr. 11 and won 5-0 in both games.

*Four different players have hit leadoff for the Ducks this season — Lovena Chaput (52); Breanne Sabol (3); Suzie Barnes (2) and Dani Baird (1)

*Suzie Barnes (CF) is the only player to have started all 57 games at the same position this season...Barnes, Chaput and Goodell are the only players to have played in all 57 games.

*Alicia Cook's 12 strikeouts vs. Portland State Feb. 20 is the third-best single-game performance in school history...Cook's first career hit was a home run

*Breanne Sabol has 20 sacrifice bunts this season — first in the Pac-10; Sabol was tied for third in the nation in sacrifice bunts (29) in 2004

*The Ducks are outscoring opponents 192-134
