



2005-06: Could be the defining season for the engine that drives the Oregon offense. Has the speed and talent to lead the Ducks in their running attack. Continues to mature and become better at setting the tempo. Follows in the footsteps of Luke Ridnour as another prep All-American point guard from the State of Washington playing for the Ducks. Says his game is patterned after Jason Kidd and Kevin Johnson. *Summer notes:* Participated in USA Basketball 20-and-Under National Team trials. Worked out in Seattle with current Sonic (and former Duck) Ridnour.

2004-05: Earned all-Pac-10 honorable mention status following some of the most impressive games ever by an Oregon sophomore. Top performance of the season was a career-high 34-point effort in a 90-83 win against USC that tied Duck great Ron Lee (versus Washington in 1974) for the most points ever by a UO sophomore. It was also the third-highest single game total by an Oregon point guard. Made 12-of-13 free throws in that game. Was named The Sporting News national player of the week for his efforts. Played in all 27 games, starting 26. Oregon's leading scorer at 14.7 points per game (10th in the Pac-10) and also led in assists at 4.6 per game (third in the Pac-10). Led the team in scoring eight times and was the assists leader 20 times. Excellent free throw shooter, hitting 94-of-110 on the season (85.5 percent) to rank third in the league. Eight assists in back-to-back games to open the season (Idaho State, New Mexico) and also scored 22 points in

early-season win over the Lobos. Netted 16 points in tough road win at Fresno State. Scored 25 points against Winthrop. Two solid efforts against Oregon State with 24 points in a home win (Jan. 8) and 21 points in a road loss (Feb. 5). Career-high nine assists in home win against Washington State.

2003-04: Earned Pac-10 All-Freshman honors despite missing 10 games due to a broken bone in his right wrist. A real difference maker in terms of what Oregon was able to accomplish on offense when he was healthy versus the games he missed. The Ducks averaged 16.7 turnovers per game while Brooks sat out with the injury; in the final 10 games with a healthy Brooks running the show, Oregon averaged just 13.2 turnovers per game. In 21 games (18 starts), was fourth on the team averaging 7.0 points per game and ranked third in assists at 2.7 per game. Also one of the Ducks' better free throw shooters at 78.8 percent. Started to show real promise the second week of the season when he scored nine points with a season-high six assists in the Pape' Jam win against Marshall. Followed that with 12 points and a season-high six rebounds against Kansas, before scoring 13 versus Santa Clara. Fantastic start to Pac-10 season featured 13 points (three-of-four threes) in win at USC. Emotional punch of the backboard support at UCLA two days later resulted in a broken hamate bone in his right wrist that required surgery and caused him to miss 10 games. Upon his return to action in mid-February, exhibited why he was sorely missed when he scored 16 points (four-of-six threes) with five assists at California and then notched a season-high 17 points two days later at Stanford.

BEFORE OREGON: Earned just about every honor possible in leading Franklin to the Washington 4A state championship as a senior. A McDonald's and Parade (third team) All-American. Played in the McDonald's and EA Sports national all-star games. Named the Gatorade, Associated Press, Seattle Times and Tacoma News Tribune state player of the year. Averaged 24.3 points, 7.0 assists, 3.3 rebounds and 2.3 steals per game as a senior as the Quakers went 25-2. Scored 38 points to lead Franklin past Mead 67-55 in the state championship game. Also had a big game against rival Garfield, scoring 31 points in a 86-70 Franklin win. Had five points and four assists in the McDonald's All-Star game. Rated the 31st-best recruit nationally ESPN.com (fourth-best among point guards) and the 37th-best by TheInsiders-Hoops.com. Played for Ernie Kent on the USA Basketball Junior National team that won the bronze medal at the 2002 qualifying tournament in Venezuela, and advanced the USA to the 2003

2005-06: Poised for a breakout season with loads of untapped potential. One of the most well-rounded players in the nation. Willing to do whatever it takes to win, be it scoring, rebounding, defending or setting up his teammates. An All-Pac-10 and All-America candidate. *Summer notes:* Invited to try out for the USA Basketball 20-and-Under National Team, but had to withdraw with a minor injury. Counselor at the Nike and Michael Jordan camps.



2004-05: Named to the Pac-10's all-freshman team. One of two freshmen to start all 27 games for Oregon. Second on the squad in scoring at 13.1 points per game (15th in the Pac-10), rebounding at 5.0 rpg (19th in the league) and assists at nearly 2.0 per game. Great season shooting from the floor (50.9 percent, 145-of-285). Led team in scoring seven times, in rebounding seven times and three times in assists. Paced team with 15 points in season-opening win over Idaho State. Had nine points and eight assists in Pape' Jam win against Vanderbilt. Bright spot with 14 points, nine rebounds and five assists in loss to No. 1 Illinois. Registered 20 points and six rebounds against Portland. Scored 19 points with seven rebounds at Stanford. Netted 20 points at Oregon State. Scored season-high 21 points at Arizona. First career double-double came at Arizona State (18 points, 11 rebounds). Also notched a double-double in home near-upset of Stanford (12 points, season-high 12 rebounds). Had 19 points in overtime win at USC.

BEFORE OREGON: The highest profile Oregon signee since Greg Ballard and Ron Lee in the 1970s. A top 10 recruit by virtually all recruiting services. A Parade and McDonald's All-American. Ranked seventh overall by Rivals and No. 10 by The Insiders. Rivals also ranked him as the nation's top shooting guard, while The Insiders put him as the fourth-best small forward. Averaged 20 points, 11 rebounds and six assists per game as a senior at Renaissance High School. Led his team to a 27-0 record, the Class B state title and a No. 3 national ranking by



Played in the 2004 McDonald's All-America game -- where he scored 11 points with three rebounds and three assists -- the Jordan Capital Classic and on the USA Hoop Summit Team that defeated the World Team 99-79. Averaged 22 points, 12 rebounds, six assists and three steals as a junior as Renaissance won the first of two straight city championships. For his career, averaged 18.7 points, 12.4 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 2.7 steals per game. Was also named all-academic at Renaissance.

HISTORICAL NOTES: Is the first three-sport letterman at Oregon since World War II (basketball, track, football). Is the Pac-10's first three-sport letterman since Arizona State's J.D. Hill (baseball, football, track) in 1967-70. Joins his father, Duck head coach Ernie Kent, as the first father-and-son, coach-player combination in the history of Oregon basketball. Is also the first second generation Duck basketball player in more than 40 years (Ernie Kent lettered at Oregon from 1974-77); the most recent one prior to Jordan was Stu Robertson (1958-60), who was the son of one of the Ducks' best pre-World War II players, Jack "Spook" Robertson (1932-34).

2005-06: After spending the fall with the Oregon football team, will return to hoops in his role as an energizer off the bench. At his best when Oregon is in the transition game or when the Ducks are pressing. A disruptive force on defense, using his speed, leaping ability and reach to create turnovers.

2004-05: Played in all 27 games, starting the final nine. Was third on the team in rebounding (4.4 rpg) and seventh in scoring (4.8 ppg). Led team in rebounding in six games. Extraordinary effort in Feb. 10 overtime loss to Washington, with team highs in points (19) and rebounds (16). Both were career highs as he nearly became Oregon's first 20-20 player since Greg Ballard had 41 points and 20 rebounds against California in 1977. Netted 14 points with three steals in win over New Mexico and dropped in 10 points in a loss at California. Had 10 rebounds in a home loss to Arizona State. Earned Pac-10 all-academic second team hon-

ors. On the track: Finished fifth in the Pac-10 in the 100 meters (10.55) and was on the 4x400 relay team that took third at the NCAA Championships (3:00.81). Anchored the school-record 4x100 meter relay team (39.20).

2003-04: Was a terrific asset on defense, particularly in the full court press. Also showed break away speed in the transition game. Played in 29 games and averaged 1.8 points and 1.2 rebounds per contest. Missed the season opener with a sprained left ankle and missed the Feb. 14 Washington State game with a sprained right ankle. Season-best four assists in Santa Clara win. Seven points and a season-high four rebounds in win at Portland. Best game of the year was the Feb. 7 win against Oregon State when he scored a season-high nine points, grabbed three rebounds and tallied a season-high three steals. *On the track:* Redshirt season.

2002-03: Redshirt season. *On the track:* An NCAA national qualifier in the 200 meters and the 4x400 relay. Won the 200 at the NCAA West Regional (20.99) and was on the 4x400 relay team that finished second. Finished fifth in the 200 at the Pac-10 Championships (21.47) and sixth in the 100 (10.57). His 200 time at the NCAA Regional meet was the sixth-fastest in school history.



BEFORE OREGON: Ranked 67th among the nation's top 100 high school seniors by ESPN.com, and No. 2 in the state of Oregon. Rated as a "Super Prospect" by FansOnly.com. An all-state second team selection who scored 15.4 points per game as Jefferson went 15-7 and finished eighth in the state and second in the P.I.L. Named MVP of the Northwest Shootout. Scored 11.6 points per game as a junior playing behind a pair of players, Aaron Miles and Michael Lee, who are now at Kansas. Teamed with those two on the 2000 Jefferson team that went 28-0 and won the 4A state title. Was one of 43 prep players invited to the 2001 USA Basketball youth developmental festival, held June, 2001, at the U.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo.

Prior to that, with Oregon holding a two-point lead Dec. 31 against USC, he hit a lay-in with 1:59 remaining to give UO the cushion to win the game. And perhaps the highlight of the season came Dec. 18 at Fresno State, when his offensive rebound and put-back jumper with 0.8 seconds lifted the Ducks to a big 83-82 non-conference road victory. Also demonstrated the ability for the big game. In addition to the 26-point performance at Washington State (in which he hit six three-pointers), he scored 18 points with five rebounds Nov. 27 versus Marshall. 


